A New Year, a New Record and Soon, a New Home for D&R Greenway Land Trust

ur 15th anniversary year at D&R Greenway Land Trust was truly something to celebrate. Our accomplishments ranged from placing a record number of properties under permanent protection to successfully completing the first phase of a \$3.5 million capital campaign to open the Johnson Education Center.

First and foremost, D&R Greenway Land Trust's mission is to preserve the open space and natural lands that protect our biodiversity, our water supply and our quality of life. The lands we protect link natural resources with the preservation of New Jersey's rich Revolutionary history. In 2004, we preserved a record 28 properties encompassing 1,260 acres—from mature forests in the Sourlands that provide habitat for wildlife and safeguard the headwaters of eight of our region's streams, to working farms that maintain the agricultural heritage of central New Jersey. We protected urban lands along important waterways, such as the Drezner property on the D&R Canal in Trenton and the Thorn property on Blacks Creek in Bordentown City. Suburban projects included the preservation of farmland, historic properties and watershed lands throughout Hunterdon, Mercer, Middlesex, Monmouth and Somerset counties in townships under continued development pressure: Cranbury, Upper Freehold, Montgomery, Hillsborough, Washington, Hopewell and Princeton. Pristine natural lands in the Amwells and Delaware Township completed the 2004 preservation landscape. (See centerfold for regional preservation map.)

Over our 15-year history, D&R Greenway Land Trust has preserved 7,893 acres of land valued at \$149.4 million, a total of 122 separate properties. In 2004, we celebrated the preservation of our 100th property *Continued on page 2*

at Pear Tree Farm in Hopewell with landowners Judy & Oye Olukotun.

This record is especially remarkable when you consider that New Jersey is our country's most densely populated state and that the pressure for development here is tremendous. In fact, a recent study by Rutgers University projects that if development continues at its current rate New Jersey will be the first completely "built out" state within 30 years. To reverse this alarming trend, all organizations charged with preserving our land must increase their pace of preservation dramatically—before the land is irretrievably altered.

In response to this threat, D&R Greenway Land Trust will open the Johnson Education Center in the fall of 2005. The mission of the Johnson Education Center is to strengthen the capacity of local governments, grassroots organizations and state, county and nonprofit partners to protect and effectively manage land. Our professional staff and other industry experts will provide hands-on education and technical assistance to empower leaders who can accelerate the pace of open space preservation. Programs offered by D&R Greenway Land Trust at the Johnson Education Center will be designed to answer the urgent need to protect as much viable land as possible, as quickly as possible. By increasing the knowl-

circa 1900 barn that will become the Johnson Education Center. The barn is located in Princeton on lands formerly owned by Robert Wood Johnson, founder of Johnson & Johnson Companies and a prominent philanthropist. The 60-acre property was preserved in 2001 as a Princeton Township park, Greenway Meadows, through a model public/private partnership led by D&R Greenway Land Trust. The Johnson Education Center will also become our permanent home. Construction is set to begin early in 2005, and we anticipate a grand opening in the coming fall.

Besides moving into a new location in 2005, we are announcing a few changes to enhance our ability to meet our land preservation mission. In order to better reflect our preservation work

D&R Greenway Land Trust Secures \$500,000 in Grants for Marsh Nature Center

On October 1, 2004 D&R Greenway Land Trust executive director Linda Mead stood with Glen Gilmore, Mayor of Hamilton Township, John Flynn, administrator of the New Jersey DEP Green Acres Program, and Mercer County Executive Brian Hughes to announce that funding has been secured to begin the process of establishing a nature center at the Hamilton-Trenton-Bordentown Marsh.

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection's Green Acres Program provided an initial \$250,000 grant to D&R Greenway Land Trust for the project, which Mercer County matched with its own \$250,000 contribution.

At the press conference, Linda Mead told the assembled crowd: "D&R Greenway Land Trust has been spearheading the movement to preserve the Hamilton-Trenton-Bordentown Marsh for over 10 years under the leadership of D&R Greenway trustee Mary Allessio Leck, Ph.D. The proposed nature center will greatly enhance the experience of everyone who visits this environmental treasure. We are very grateful to our partners for funding this important project."

The Hamilton-Trenton-Bordentown Marsh is a unique natural oasis in a densely developed region—an urban wetland with significant biological and historical resources. The northernmost tidal freshwater wetland on the Delaware River, the Marsh provides diverse habitat for over 230 species of birds, 890 species of plants, and many species of mammals, amphibians and reptiles, including a number of threatened and endangered species. Because of the numerous ecological studies conducted here since the early 1970s, the Marsh is highly regarded by wetlands scientists both nationally and abroad.

In addition to its environmental significance, many important historic and archeological features are located within the Hamilton-Trenton-Bordentown Marsh. These include the Abbott Farm National Historic Landmark, the D&R Canal, Point Breeze in Bordentown—once the home of Joseph Bonaparte, Napoleon's brother—and the Watson House, the oldest structure in Mercer County, built in 1708. Because of the development surrounding the Marsh, and the fact that no single entity or governing body holds jurisdiction over the entire region, the Marsh and the plants and wildlife that make their home here are under constant threat. Local residents, scientists, environmentalists, educators and lovers of the natural world have stepped forward to champion the existence of this amazing ecosystem.

As part of our effort to help protect the Marsh, D&R Greenway Land Trust helped launch Friends for the Marsh in 2002. This grassroots organization is dedicated to protecting the natural, historical and recreational resources of the Marsh, to promoting research and actions that lead to enhanced stewardship, to expanding educational opportunities, and to increasing the public's awareness, appreciation and use of the Marsh. The funding for the Nature and Interpretive Center is a huge step forward for the Friends for the Marsh and for the residents of the urban centers that surround it.

According to Mary Allessio Leck, a founding member of Friends for the Marsh, "The nature center will become an invaluable resource for visitors and for the volunteers and supporters who work tirelessly to protect this unique ecosystem." The Nature and Interpretive Center holds the promise of many benefits including:

• Educational experiences for students of all ages to learn about the importance of wetlands and the diversity of organisms found at the Marsh, and the opportunity to connect with the rich culture and history of the area.

• Increased support for wildlife habitat and resource protection.

• Recreational activities through the extension of trails and interpretive programs.

• Ecotourism opportunities that will add to the revitalization of Trenton.

• A year-round, all-weather learning facility.

• Enhancement of a growing public/ private partnership for protection and preservation of the Marsh with participation from the State, Mercer and Burlington Counties, local municipalities including the cities of Trenton and Bordentown, and the townships of Hamilton and Bordentown. D&R Greenway Land Trust is pleased to announce the continued enhancement of our professional land preservation team.

Bill Rawlyk has been promoted to Director of Land Preservation for D&R Greenway Land Trust. Bill has been with D&R Greenway since 1999. He first served as a trustee before becoming our staff specialist in land preservation. New Jersey DEP Honors D&R Greenway Land Trust with Environmental Excellence Award

D&R Greenway Land Trust received a New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Award from DEP Commissioner Bradley M. Campbell on November 16, 2004. This honor is presented to organizations in recognition of outstanding environmental performance, programs and achievements. D&R Greenway Land Trust won in the category of Open Space Protection and Preservation.

According to Commissioner Campbell, "These awards recognize the leaders in New Jersey who are achieving superior environmental performance. These leaders are setting the standard for innovation and commitment, while reminding us that the best ideas in environmental protection emerge from local problem solving rather than traditional regulation."

Our groundbreaking work in the Sourland Mountains was the catalyst for the award. The Sourlands represent a wilderness close to a rapidly growing population, providing easy access to nature "in the backyard" of many local residents. D&R Greenway Land Trust has articulated a vision for the protection of this unique and irreplaceable resource and has taken effective action, accelerating the pace of direct land preservation and public education about the Sourlands to a local, regional and statewide audience. We've established a base of land preservation in the Sourlands

through permanent protection of over 3,400 acres. Five years ago, D&R Greenway Land Trust was the only conservation group actively focusing on the Sourlands. Today, due to our steady leadership, the NJDEP Green Acres Program, The Nature Conservancy, the Sourlands Regional Planning Council, and all of the region's local communities have identified the Sourlands as a priority for preservation.

"We are thrilled to have our

work recognized by the State," commented Linda Mead. "What's even more important is that this award brings additional awareness and focus on the need for swift and decisive action to preserve as much of the area's watershed lands and biodiversity as possible. The Sourlands shelter the headwaters of eight of central New Jersey's major rivers and streams-the primary source of drinking water for our entire region. They also provide the contiguous, deep forest habitat essential for maintaining global populations of over 65 species of neotropical migrant birds."

The desire to protect this critical habitat inspired us to initiate the first international partnership between two land preservation organizations. Amigos de Calakmul is a Mexican land trust formed to protect the tropical forest surrounding the Calakmul Biosphere Reserve in the Yucatan, the winter habitat for the birds that breed in the Sourlands in the spring and summer. In 2004, D&R Greenway Land Trust and Amigos de Calakmul launched the Sister Land Trust Project with the shared objective of protecting the critical habitat of both regions.

2004 Preservation Landscape

&R Greenway Land Trust added a record 28 properties spanning 6 counties and 13 municipalities to the preservation landscape in 2004.

Supporters frequently ask how we decide on priority lands for preservation. The answer is illustrated in the diversity of our 2004 preservation landscape.

Each property must fit into a regional preservation vision. The lands we protect link natural resources with the preservation of New Jersey's rich Revolutionary history. Most important is the land's conservation value – watershed lands, stream corridors, fields and woodlands that support biodiversity get top priority. Expanding existing preserves builds large blocks of intact habitat important for the survival of wildlife and the migratory birds that breed in the Sourlands and the Hamilton-Trenton-Bordentown Marsh.

Community values help determine how we apply our resources. Residents of New Jersey, the Garden State, value farm landscapes and fresh produce close at hand. Preservation of working farms in Upper Freehold, Cranbury, Hopewell, East Amwell and Delaware townships helps keep New Jersey's \$855 million agricultural industry viable.

Supporters told us in a survey that they value hiking, birdwatching, canoeing and outdoor activities. Providing parks and trails where local residents can enjoy the beauty of nature and the health benefits of an active lifestyle is important to D&R Greenway Land Trust.

By applying a strategic vision to land preservation we are linking open spaces, protecting our natural resources and enhancing the quality of our communities for all who live and work here. And, land preservation just makes good economic sense. For every single family home built, the cost of providing local services typically exceeds the direct tax revenue from the new development. Thus, every donated dollar that helps D&R Greenway Land Trust preserve land reflects real value back to our donors.

How Many Houses?
